EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is the third Annual Report of The Fairlight Foundation, outlining its 2023 activities. It provides a summary of The Foundation, its 2023 internship programme and other key activities, outcomes and highlights, operational matters, and acknowledges contributors and supporters.

The Foundation's activities are managed by our Executive Director Laura Koot in close co-operation with Fairlight Station staff, under governorship of the Board of Trustees.

Be Professional is one of the Foundation's core values and we strive to live this mantra both in, and out of, the paddock. This value recognises that anyone, at any stage in their career, can be a leader and a role model. This core value acts as a reminder for our interns to act professionally when working at Fairlight, when representing Fairlight Station and the Foundation at industry events and workshops, and when socialising outside of the programme. Our interns know that you don't need a leadership title to be a leader, because our definition of a leader is simply someone that inspires others positively and supports others to achieve their goals.

Our education partnership with Land Based Training continues to flourish and we appreciate the flexible delivery and fit-for-purpose content that their qualifications deliver to our programme. This year we also started discussions with Land Based Training on how we could work together to deliver short courses that provide practical, operational farming skills to inexperienced shepherds already in employment. We will be developing this further in 2024.

Our focus on personal and professional development is something that differentiates us from other farm training programmes and in 2023 our interns completed a series of workshops with HALO Training. HALO's workshops focus on the human side of leadership, empowering people, teams and organisations to thrive in times of adversity. The increased confidence and professional aptitude the interns gained from these workshops was notable.

The deck, and plumbing and electrical services for the Smith Crane and Construction accommodation blocks were completed and council consent was issued this year. A group of vet tech students from Telford and their tutors were the first to use the accommodation blocks for 3 days while they took part in practical training with the Fairlight Station deer and sheep to gain valuable hands-on livestock experience for their diploma. We are privileged to have had these accommodation facilities donated to the programme by Smith Crane and Construction and they will be well utilised in the future to help us advance the careers of many aspiring rural professionals.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY CONT.

Our interns travelled to Telford early in the year for their first shearing workshop and developed their basic shearing skills alongside the Telford students. Telford looked after and accommodated our interns for 4 days for this workshop and then also allowed their farm tutor Ken Payne to spend a further 4 days at Fairlight later in the year refining the interns shearing skills and teaching them butchery and fencing basics. We are thankful for the strong reciprocal relationship we have developed with Telford and are privileged that we get to work together to advance the rural careers of both Telford students and the Foundation interns.

A major landmark project that was completed in 2023 was the construction of a purpose built accommodation and workshop facility for The Fairlight Foundation, based on Fairlight Station. The 2024 interns will be the first to reside in this newly constructed premises and all future Foundation workshops and meetings will take place here. The Foundation building has been thoughtfully designed and constructed with a 100 year vision to not just accommodate the interns, but to also act as a multi-purpose building that can be used to host workshops, small events and conferences. Thank you to local building company Koota Construction for managing the build project.

The Fairlight Foundation Board and Executive Director would like to formally thank the Fairlight Station farming team as well as our sponsors and programme contributors. With their support, we have delivered another well-rounded internship programme in 2023 and look forward to expanding our programme and operations in years to come.



The Foundation once again acknowledges the support and generosity of the large number of agencies, businesses and individuals who have supported us financially, in-kind or in-person, as listed toward the end of this report.

KEY ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

The Foundation has had a productive 2023 and has made developments in several areas of the programme. While a number of highlights are presented elsewhere in this report, the key activities and achievements are:

The 12-Month Internship Programme

Three recent agricultural university graduates were selected for the 2023 internship programme. This was a full-time residential programme with the interns accommodated on-farm. They were provided with a stipend to support them for the "learning" component of the internship, supplemented by a modest wage to recognise their contribution to Fairlight Station while honing skills in a casual worker capacity. Interns participated in all activities during the annual farming cycle, developing and practising an extensive range of practical skills to a level of competency. This was supplemented by professional skills and knowledge development delivered by workshops from a range of experts, attendance to a number of off-farm events, conferences and workshops, and completion of the Land Based Training animal production programme at Level 5 and practical Level 3 qualifications. Interns also participated in a number of personal and professional skills development workshops.

The internship was subject to one formative internal and one summative external review, resulting in additions and developments based on feedback and experiences during the year. This has contributed significantly to establishing confidence in the design and delivery of this programme for 2024 and beyond.

Funding

Our sponsorship strategy has been developed to underpin endeavors to achieve a range of financial support from commercial and philanthropic sources. An encouraging level of cash and in-kind support continues to create a sustainable financial base for future internships, and other expanded activities. Special mention must be made to Doug and Mari Harpur whose generous endowment fund continues to support our development. Other significant financial donations in 2023 were received from John and Judy Collis, MPI, Contiki, AAT Kings, FMG, Ballance and Findex. We again thank Smith Crane and Construction for their significant contribution by donating the relocatable accommodation blocks, and the internship also financially benefited from our partnership with qualification provider Land Based Training due to the TEC funding we receive from this partnership.

KEY ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS CONT.

Staffing

The Foundation's Executive Director, Laura Koot, is responsible for management activities for the Foundation including, internship programme development and implementation involving coordination of the large number of external contributors to professional and personal development workshops, networking, sponsorship, facilities development and planning future direction and activities. Internship practical skills tuition is undertaken by Fairlight Station staff under the direction of its managing director, Simon Wright, complemented by external expertise in targeted areas.

Facilities

Construction was completed on the new Foundation building which will become the interns' residence. Its purpose-built meeting room and open plan living and dining area will host a number of the internship programme's technical, personal and professional development workshops and further short-term activities in future. The building has been designed with a 100-year vision in mind and will act as a multi-purpose facility. Thank you to local company Koota Construction for undertaking this project and completing the build for the Foundation.

The deck, plumbing and electrical services for the Smith Crane and Construction accommodation blocks were completed and council consent was issued this year. These accommodation blocks will be used to house small groups, like the Telford vet tech students, when they visit Fairlight for short farm experience and training programmes.

Networking, On-Line Presence and Industry Awareness

The Foundation continues to develop a presence and links with a range of industry representational groups along with organisations with a common interest in advancing women in agriculture. Governmental agencies supporting industry skills development have been approached to ascertain future support options. The Foundation Facebook and Instagram pages have created a significant following, complementing a wider media presence through farming and local news media, such as regular radio interviews on the Rural Exchange radio show thanks to our Mediaworks sponsors. We also featured on Jimmy Doherty's Great NZ Escape TV series that aired in New Zealand and the UK. Laura has attended various industry events such as the New Zealand Primary Industry Awards and Summit in Wellington as a finalist in their Emerging Leader category. Laura also delivered presentations at Lincoln and Massey Universities and at an Impact 100 event charity to share the Foundation's mission and details of its programme.

2023 SELECTED PROGRAMME HIGHLIGHTS

(in no particular order)

Garston Sheep Dog Trials

Held in the last weekend of February, the local Garston Sheep Dog Trials is a highlight on our calendar every year. It is the intern's first volunteer opportunity and a great way for them to get a taste of what is involved in the sport of dog trialing. This event also introduces the interns to the wider rural and working dog community which allows them to start developing their networks.

Shearing Course

Ken Payne has been instructing shearing for nearly two decades at Telford and his time at Fairlight teaching our interns how to take wool off a sheep was one of the interns biggest highlights this year. We thank Telford and Ken for their support helping us deliver shearing, fencing and butchery skills at a high standard to our interns.

Sheep Dog Training Opportunities

Kerry Chittock and Jackie Sarginson are both respected local working dog trainers and sheep dog trial competitors. They each gave up significant amounts of their time to spend with the interns to help them bring on their own heading dog pups and huntaways. Simon Wright and Andrew Wright also dedicated countless hours guiding the interns and helping them with their young working dog teams.

Generation Next Beef and Lamb Series

The interns all attended this worthwhile workshop series with Beef and Lamb NZ. They travelled to Gore and Dunedin to network with other young farmers and thoroughly enjoyed the learning components of the programme.

ANZ Financial Literacy and Farm Investment Workshop

Steve King and Lee Hodsell from ANZ visited Fairlight to hold a workshop with the interns covering a range of financial topics including basic investing, tools and techniques for saving, how create a bank lending proposal and stock and land leasing models. Steve and Lee were very engaging and the interns financial literacy and confidence improved significantly after this session.

The Team Building Company Personality Profiling Workshop

Jenny Gray from the Team Building Company provided a comprehensive DiSC personality profiling and team communication workshop at Fairlight. The interns and Fairlight team were able to better understand what their personal strengths and weakness are, improve their ability to communicate thoughtfully and effectively and understand how their behaviour affects those that work with them.

Open Day

We held our Open Day on the 24th June and it was well attended by potential applicants for the 2024 programme as well as many local supporters and sponsors. It was the first opportunity the interns had to have a go at speaking publicly and they did brilliantly.

Zoetis Workshop Series

Once again this year the Zoetis workshops run by Victoria Chapman and Clive Bigham were a highlight of the programme. Victoria and Clive presented a range of technical animal health workshops that were informative, engaging and thoroughly appreciated by the interns. HALO Leadership


